Adults Need to Update Your Youth Protection Training



It is very important that all adults in the troop be aware that to accompany any scouts on a campout you <u>MUST</u> complete your Youth Protection training. This is to help keep our Scouts safer both in Scouting and in their daily lives. Effective with the upcoming re-charter period, Youth Protection Training (YPT) for leaders must be current throughout the entire 12 months of the charter period in order to reregister. This policy will require that all leaders renew their YPT bi-annually. The YPT certification is good for 2 years, but it is good practice to renew it annually.

In order for the troop to include you on our re-charter this fall, your training record must show that you have updated your training. Please retake the course this month. It only takes about 30 minutes of your time and will help the troop. For detailed instruction on how to take your training online, see page 2 of this newsletter.

How to take your Online Youth Protection Training

FOLLOW THESE INSTRUCTIONS:

Go to **www.my.scouting.org**. If this is your first time here click 'Create an Account' to create a username and password.

You will be asked a few of questions with associated drop down lists. You will be asked if you know your member ID number, enter your member ID number if you know it. Otherwise, choose No.

On the next screen enter your personal contact information and email address, once entered, click on the button near the bottom labelled:

Click to Accept Terms and Conditions.

Then enter the security code from the image and then click on the Next button. After all that, you will be prompted to enter a username. Make it a good one! You can click on the Check Availablity button to verify that it is available. Once you have a username chosen, you will then be presented with some more fields to fill out. Security questions and answers, the usual fare. After you have submitted the proper papers and a blood sample, you will be presented with a screen that states that an E-Mail has been sent to your account. Click on Continue to continue.

Take YPT!

Click on the logo for Youth Protection Training on the right hand side of the screen. You could also go to the HOME menu on the left of the screen, click My Dashboard. Either way, you will see a listing of courses near the bottom of the screen. Click on Take Course on the Youth Protection Line. This will start the course presentation.

It should take about 30 minutes. Once completed please send a copy of your training certificate to Matt Smoger. To do so, choose the option to print the certificate at the end of the training. Caution! When the training is complete you will also have the option to view a letter from the Scout Executive before printing your certificate. When you close the letter it may close your browser session. You will have to log into My.Scouting.Org again to print the certificate. Email your completed certificate to msmoger@att.net or bring a hardcopy to the next troop meeting.

What Happens to a Scout?

For every 100 boys who join Scouting, records indicate that:

- Rarely will one be brought before the juvenile court system
- 4 will become Eagle Scouts
- 17 will become future Scout volunteers
- 12 will have their first contact with a church

- 1 will enter the clergy
- 5 will earn their church award
- 18 will develop a hobby that will last through their adult life
- 8 will enter a vocation that was learned through the merit badge system
- 1 will use his Scouting skills to save his own life
- 1 will use his Scouting skills to save the life of another person



Camp Rotary

Set on one of the country's clearest spring-fed lakes in Michigan's lower peninsula, Camp Rotary boasts perhaps the most beautiful waterfront of any Scout camp in the state and is able to offer a huge variety of programs that you may not find anywhere else. From our amazing waterfront activities like; fishing, paddle-boarding, motor-boating, kayaking and rowing, Scouts will have an opportunity to stay wet all day!



With over 1100 acres, Rotary is also prepared to thrill the landlubber as well. Scouts will have a blast at our Night Crawler program where the can climb or zip line to the light of the moon. Unique camp programs like Rustic Putt-Putt, Movie Night, Muzzle Loader Pistol Shoot, Big Daddy Bass Tournament are the reason that Scouts keep coming back to Rotary for their summer camp experience.

Of course no camp would be complete without advancement, and Rotary has that too! With over 72 merit badges offered at our Scoutcraft Skill Center, Nature Center, Industrial Arts area and our Handicraft center, Scouts will be amazed at what they can accomplish in just one week.

Custaloga Town Scout Reservation



When attending CTSR you will find a camping program that will meet the needs of every Boy Scout, Cub Scout, and Adult Scouter. Additionally, a wide variety of camping opportunities are offered throughout the year. In the Boy Scout Summer Camp Program a first year camper program (called Guyasutha's Braves) is offered, as well as more challenging programs for the experienced Scout. These include canoeing, climbing and rappelling, biking, boating and much more.

Custaloga Town provides a shower facility, a fully equipped dining hall, a First Aid building staffed 24 hours a day by certified medical personnel, supervised boating and swimming, a field sports program with .22 rifle, archery, and shotgun ranges; a nature build-

ing, craft lodge, scout craft area, a climbing tower, the trading post, and much more. Custaloga Town Scout Reservation provides each unit with a campsite, which contains two-man tents on wooden platforms with bunks, picnic tables, bulletin board, flagpole, campfire area, washstand, and a latrine. All sites have a pavilion with picnic tables available. There are also modern facilities available for adults to use at their leisure.

Falling Rock Scout Camp

Located 11 miles north of Newark, Ohio, Camp Falling Rock sits on more than 600 acres of land with rolling hardwood forests, streams and waterfalls, and scenic meadows. Large rock formations provide a beautiful backdrop to a historic covered bridge. Camp Falling Rock's facilities include: A well equipped Dining Hall, plenty of of lodges and tent camping sites, a pool, a brand new shooting sports pavilion, a climbing



tower and an activity field. The Frontiersman Program, Foxfire Day Program, and Natural Rock Rapelling. Camp Falling Rock is proud to have its own mad made lake. We offer several boating merit badges as well as Kayaking BSA. Any individual interested in participating in aquatic activities must pass a BSA swim test.
