Adults Need to Update Your Youth Protection Training



It is very important that all adults in the troop be aware that to accompany any scouts on a campout you <u>MUST</u> complete your Youth Protection training. This is to help keep our Scouts safer both in Scouting and in their daily lives. Effective with the upcoming re-charter period, Youth Protection Training (YPT) for leaders must be current throughout the entire 12 months of the charter period in order to reregister. This policy will require that all leaders renew their YPT bi-annually. The YPT certification is good for 2 years, but it is good practice to renew it annually.

In order for the troop to include you on our re-charter this fall, your training record must show that you have updated your training. Please retake the course this month. It only takes about 30 minutes of your time and will help the troop. For detailed instruction on how to take your training online, see page 2 of this newsletter.

Patrol Leader Council

All boy scout troops have a council of patrol leaders lead by the Senior Patrol leader. From pg 41 of the Scout Handbook: "Patrol leaders get together with the senior patrol leader and adult leaders this constitutes the Patrol Leader Council (PLC) The PLC meets to consider ideas from all the Scouts and develop a vision for what the troop can achieve in the weeks and months ahead. The patrol leader's council will layout the steps that lead toward that vision and decide how to complete each step to keep the troop moving toward its goals".

Troop 211's PLC meets on a bi-weekly basis, *usually* the first and third Wednesday. We meet 1 hour before our meeting, 6pm—7pm. We discuss the upcoming campouts and events, in addition to the current month's meetings. Please look to this newsletter for the schedule of PLC meetings for each month!

How to take your Online Youth Protection Training

FOLLOW THESE INSTRUCTIONS:

Go to **www.my.scouting.org**. If this is your first time here click 'Create an Account' to create a username and password.

You will be asked a few of questions with associated drop down lists. You will be asked if you know your member ID number, enter your member ID number if you know it. Otherwise, choose No.

On the next screen enter your personal contact information and email address, once entered, click on the button near the bottom labelled: Click to Accept Terms and Conditions.

Then enter the security code from the image and then click on the Next button. After all that, you will be prompted to enter a username. Make it a good one! You can click on the Check Availablity button to verify that it is available. Once you have a username chosen, you will then be presented with some more fields to fill out. Security questions and answers, the usual fare. After you have submitted the proper papers and a blood sample, you will be presented with a screen that states that an E-Mail has been sent to your

account. Click on Continue to continue.

Take YPT!

Click on the logo for Youth Protection
Training on the right hand side of the screen. You
could also go to the HOME menu on the left of the
screen, click My Dashboard. Either way, you will
see a listing of courses near the bottom of the
screen. Click on Take Course on the Youth Protection Line. This will start the course presentation.

It should take about 30 minutes. Once completed please send a copy of your training certificate to Pat Morgan. To do so, choose the option to print the certificate at the end of the training. Caution! When the training is complete you will also have the option to view a letter from the Scout Executive before printing your certificate. When you close the letter it may close your browser session. You will have to log into www.My.Scouting.Org again to print the certificate. Email your completed certificate to Mr. Morgan or bring a hardcopy to the next troop meeting.

What Happens to a Scout?

For every 100 boys who join Scouting, records indicate that:

- Rarely will one be brought before the juvenile court system
- 4 will become Eagle Scouts
- 17 will become future Scout volunteers
- 12 will have their first contact with a church

- 1 will enter the clergy
- 5 will earn their church award
- 18 will develop a hobby that will last through their adult life
- 8 will enter a vocation that was learned through the merit badge system
- 1 will use his Scouting skills to save his own life
- 1 will use his Scouting skills to save the life of another person

Plans for the weekend include the scouts taking a hike on one of the many trails that the camp has to offer. This campout will also offer the scouts that need it, the opportunity to work on the Totin Chip, and the Firemn Chit. We will also be visiting the headstone of the camp mascot, Jake the Goose.

Mr. Thomas has also challenged the scouts to use alternative methods of cooking. The camp stoves are off limits! That leaves, Dutch Oven, Open Flame, Foil Packet, or some other means. There must be one item for each meal that has to be cooked!

For the hike each scout will be expected to bring a day pack or cinch sack, hiking shoes/boots, a healthy snack to each on the hike, and a water bottle or two!

The scouts will be sleeping in tents on this

trip, while the adults will get the "luxury" of sleeping in the cabin! The weather on this campout may be cold, so please pack accordingly! Long johns or thermal underwear is a must, as is clean wool or polyester socks to change into at night to sleep in! A knit or stocking hat is also recommended for sleeping as well! 

The boys will need to choose, and quickly, the Summer Camp that they wish to attend next year (2018). The options that are available are:



Camp Rotary

Set on one of the country's clearest spring-fed lakes in Michigan's lower peninsula, Camp Rotary boasts perhaps the most beautiful waterfront of any Scout camp in the state and is able to offer a huge variety of programs that you may not find anywhere else. From our amazing waterfront activities like; fishing, paddle-boarding, motor-boating, kayaking and rowing, Scouts will have an opportunity to stay wet all day!

Unique camp programs like Rustic Putt-Putt, Movie Night, Muzzle Loader Pistol Shoot, Big Daddy Bass Tournament are the reason that Scouts keep coming back to Rotary for their summer camp experience.

Of course no camp would be complete without advancement, and Rotary has that too! With over 72 merit badges offered at our Scoutcraft Skill Center, Nature Center, Industrial Arts area and our Handicraft center, Scouts will be amazed at what they can accomplish in just one week.

Gerber Scout Reservation



66 merit badges were offered in 2017. Camp is approximately 3.5 hours from New Baltimore. First opened in 1951, Gerber Scout Reservation is located in the Manistee National Forest near Twin Lake, Michigan. Gerber Scout Reservation operates Boy Scout Summer Camp and Webelos & Cub Scout Summer Camp.

Gerber currently has the capacity to accommodate 425 Boy Scouts, 200 Cub Scouts each week or session. Activities offered at the camp include the Waterfront, Honor Ground, Climbing Tower/COPE, Scoutcraft, Handicraft, Environmental Resource Center, Archery, and Shooting Sports. In 2008, a Technology Center was added to the camp, offering a new-age spin on the traditional summer camp experience.

Owasippe Scout Reservation

Owasippe Scout Reservation, commonly referred to as "America's Premier Scout Camp", is owned and operated by the Pathway To Adventure Council, Boy Scouts of America. It began operations in 1911 with

a limited camping experience getting 40 acres of wilderness property ready for full operation in 1912. The Reservation has operated continuously since that time and now sits on approximately 4800 acres, adjacent to The Manistee National Forest. With over 100 years of experience, we have a long tradition of Scouting excellence at Owasippe that we would like to share with you. Our camps offer varied Scout programs that will enhance your Scout's advancement. Whether you are new to Owasippe with younger Scouts, or have an established troop, we have an adventure that fits every age level.

Here at Owasippe, we want the Tenderfoot or the Life Scout to enjoy his stay; give him the chance to advance in rank, explore the abundant program resources that can be found on the reservation and participate in troop and camp wide activities.
